Special Legislative Update

Residential Health Care Facility Bill (S2563/A4163) Signed into Law

On September 13, 2017, S2563/A4163, a resident protection bill, was signed into Law (P.L.2017, c.234). This new Law protects residents of community Residential Health Care Facilities (RHCFs) from eviction without due process and ensures that they are not retaliated against for complaining about sub-standard living conditions.

Advocacy from the Mental Health Association in New Jersey (MHANJ) and the Community Health Law Project, with support from all New Jersey Mental Health Coalition members and the NJ Behavioral Health Planning Council, helped this important piece of legislation pass both the Senate and Assembly unanimously. The MHANJ would like to recognize the sponsors of this Bill, Senators Weinberg and, Kean, and Assembly members Vainieri Huttle, O'Scanlon and Lampitt for their support and recognition of the need to protect the rights of RHCF residents.

Specifically, P.L.2017, c.234 will provide residents with due process prior to eviction and will help protect them from retaliation for complaining about substandard conditions in these homes. Due process guarantees that an eviction in a community RHCF can occur only based on one of the grounds listed in the New Jersey Anti-Eviction Act and by a New Jersey Superior Court Judge.

Individuals residing in these community RHCFs are most often persons living with a mental health, substance use or co-occurring condition. Residents regularly live in fear of reporting RHCF violations to the proper authorities, worried they will be evicted. To see the full text of P.L.2017, c.234, click here.

MHANJ, along with our community partners, have been advocating to improve conditions in rooming and boarding homes and RHCFs. A series of recommendations to improve conditions has been presented to the state and county authorities, and the implementation of these recommendations is ongoing. The signature of this Bill into law is one of several important legislative, regulatory and policy changes that help to address the poor conditions that exist in some of these facilities.
